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### ***From the Assessor, Paul Arnold***

Williams Township is initiating a five year revaluation program beginning in 2011. This is in adherence to the State of Michigan's mandate for uniform assessments. I will be making on-site visits for 20% of the parcels each year. I'll be comparing the information that is currently listed as being on each parcel with what I observe. New additions will be added to the assessment roll for the 2012 tax year, while anything that has been removed will be deducted from next year's tax roll.

Be aware that your taxable value is not increased for repairing or replacing items that already exist on your property. Let's say your home is 35 years old and you have recently replaced windows, siding, soffits, or remodeled your kitchen or bath. As long as you have replaced or remodeled what you already have, your taxable value need not be increased. There is a State Tax Commission form, #865, titled, "*Request for nonconsideration of true cash value of normal repair, replacement and maintenance expenditures*". Completion of this form is not mandatory, but it does afford you the protection from unnecessary increases in taxable value. The form, along with instructions is available at the township office. I'll be happy to answer any questions you have about its completion.

The first year I'll be updating agricultural parcels. I'll be updating soil types, tile, outbuildings and structures along with residential buildings and land improvements. If no one is home, I may leave a form letter for you to complete and return, or request a time when it's convenient for you to meet with me.

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### ***From The Treasurer***

#### **2011 Summer Property Taxes**

You should receive your summer 2011 Property Tax bill by July 1<sup>st</sup>. If you do not receive your tax bill by July 1<sup>st</sup> or shortly thereafter, let our office know as soon as possible so we can send you a copy of your bill. Be sure to review your tax bill as soon as you receive it to verify that all information is correct (i.e. address, principal residence exemption status, etc.). If there are any errors, please contact our office immediately so the necessary corrections can be made. Any errors will be corrected at the Board of Review meeting held on July 19th.

Summer property taxes may be paid or deferred between July 1<sup>st</sup> and September 14<sup>th</sup> without penalty. Beginning September 15<sup>th</sup> a 1% late penalty will be added to all unpaid summer tax bills. An additional 1% will be added each month through February 14<sup>th</sup>. An additional 3% penalty will be added on February 15<sup>th</sup>.

You may pay your property taxes in person at the treasurer's office, by mail, or by placing your payment in our drop box located in the front of our office building. ***If using our drop box, please do not pay with cash, checks only!*** If you require a "**Stamped Paid Receipt**", please include a self-addressed stamped envelope.

If you cannot pay your taxes in full, we do accept partial payments which can be weekly or monthly. Just remember that any balance left after the September 14<sup>th</sup> deadline will incur penalties until paid off.

If you qualify and plan to defer your summer property taxes, stop by the treasurer's office as soon as possible to sign a deferment form. A new deferment form must be executed each year. This form is also available online at [www.williamstwp.com/treasurer.asp](http://www.williamstwp.com/treasurer.asp).

Our summer office hours are Monday through Thursday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The Township office will be closed on Fridays from Memorial Day to Labor Day.

**Pets in Williams Township Park**

Many folks find the Williams Township Park a great place to take their pets for a walk. Please be a responsible pet owner when enjoying the Township Park. Pets in the Williams Township Park must be kept on a leash at all times. In addition, pet owners must pick up any pet waste from their pets and deposit it in a trash receptacle. "Doggie Walk Bags" are supplied at the park entrance for this purpose. Thank you for your help!

**Dog and Cat Licenses**

If your dog or cat is licensed with Bay County, the County will send you the form for your new license in the mail a month before your old license expires, which is also when your animal needs their rabies vaccination.

Licenses may be purchased at most veterinary's offices, at any Township Office, at Animal Control, and at the Bay County Treasurer's Office. The cost for a 1 year license for an unaltered cat or dog is \$21 and \$7 for spayed or neutered pets. A 3 year license can be purchased if a rabies vaccination is good for 3 years, unaltered \$54 and spayed and/or neutered \$18.

When purchasing your new license please bring the form that the County sent you and proof of the rabies vaccination. Licenses for a new animal may be purchased by providing proof of rabies vaccination and if your animal was spayed or neutered, proof will also be required.

Delinquent licenses can only be purchased at the Bay County Treasures office or Animal Control.

**Do you need a U.S. Passport?**

U.S. citizens may apply for their passport books and passport cards during regular business hours (and after hours by appointment) at the township clerk's office. A certified birth certificate with a raised seal, ***not a copy***, and one picture must be presented when making application. Normal processing by the U.S. Department of State takes approximately six weeks; two week rush processing is available for an extra \$60.

All U.S. Citizens must present a valid U.S. Passport Book or U.S. Passport Card when entering the United States from a foreign country, including Canada, Mexico and the Caribbean.

The standard passport fee is \$110 for adults and \$80 for children younger than 16. The standard fee for the passport card is \$30 for adults and \$15 for children younger than 16. The passport card was designed for

entry at land and sea ports-of-entry and is ***not*** valid for international travel by air. We have application forms, renewal forms and numerous other miscellaneous forms that may be required depending on the applicant's particular situation.

**Permanent Absent Voter List**

A permanent list of absent voters is maintained by the township clerk for persons wanting to receive an application for an absent voter ballot prior to each election. Applications are automatically mailed approximately six weeks prior to all elections. This is a convenient solution for those over 60 years of age, physically unable to attend the polls without assistance, or for those away from the community who want to vote but cannot get to the polls on Election Day.

Burial fees are \$150.00 per space for Williams Township and City of Auburn residents and \$250.00 per space for non-residents. Opening and closing fees are \$375.00 and Cremation fees are \$125.00

**Waste Management**

It is strongly encouraged that all trash be placed in bags, whether in or out of trash cans (including "Green Monsters"). This will help assure that the trash ends up in the landfill where it belongs, and not blowing around the Township, especially on windy collection days.

Items banned from Michigan landfills include whole tires, beverage containers, yard waste, lead acid batteries, used oil, low-level radioactive waste, regulated hazardous waste, liquid waste, sewage, PCBs and asbestos waste.

Please do not place grass clippings, yard waste, leaves, or debris in the ditches. This contributes to poor drainage for you, your neighbors, and the entire township. Waste Management picks up yard waste weekly on your normal trash collection day from April 1<sup>st</sup> through the end of November. All trucks begin their routes at 7 a.m.

**Ordinance Violations**

In 2010 Williams Township adopted an ordinance to control and regulate the growth of noxious weeds in our township. Property owners will be responsible for the removal of certain weeds, grasses and other vegetation in excess of 10" in height or in spread. Copies of this ordinance are available on our website or you can pick one up at the township office.

If you would like to report a violation of any of the township ordinances, you may do so by filing a written complaint with the Township Zoning Administrator. Complaint forms are available in the township office. The Zoning Administrator will investigate the complaint and take an appropriate course of action.

**Brush Chipping and Disposal**

Williams Township continues to offer a residential brush chipping service. This service is for township residents that have trimmed their own trees themselves as an alternative to open burning. Commercial tree cutting services and "For-Hire" tree cutters must dispose of the trees and brush they cut and trim.

Brush must be placed at the road shoulder with all ends facing towards the road. Pieces must be small enough and piled appropriately for one person to handle. Due to ever increasing fuel costs, please call the Township Office to be placed on the "Chipping List" when the brush is ready to chip so we can route the crew in the most efficient manner. Chipping requests should be limited to 30 minutes per month per household. Additional time above that will be charged at a rate of \$50 per hour.

Whenever you have a couple of branches or a small amount of brush please put it out for Waste Management to pick up as yard waste on your normal trash pickup day. Brush for Waste Management pickup needs to be placed in paper yard waste bags, containers marked "Yard Waste," or tied together in bundles up to 24 inches in diameter, up to 48 inches in length, and weighing no more than 50 pounds per bundle, with individual pieces not exceeding 2 inches in diameter.

**Open Burning**

Open burning of brush is allowed in Williams Township by permit only. Two types of permits are available, an Open Burning Permit, and a Recreation Fire Pit Permit.

Open Burning Permits, good for a maximum of 4 days only, may be obtained by calling the township office with the dates you plan to burn, name, address, location of burning, and phone number. People that open burn must also comply with the Williams Township Burning Ordinance and Guidelines.

Recreational Fire Pits are allowed in Williams Township by permit only. Permits can be obtained for a \$10.00 fee by completing an application and location diagram, and receiving approval from the township Zoning Administrator. This type of permit is good for 5 years when approved and inspected.

Wood from trees and brush is the only material that may be burned with either type of permit. Burning with either permit cannot cause a nuisance or hazard to adjoining persons or property by reason of heat, flame, fly-ash, sparks, smoke, or odor.

Unfortunately, the Fire Department is dispatched to nuisance open burning fires several times each year. The Township's Cost Recovery Ordinance does authorize the Fire Department to charge the property owner in the event they are dispatched to a nuisance open burning fire. Please obtain a permit and follow the Township's Burning Ordinance and Guidelines.

## **From The Supervisor**

### **Township Roads**

Again this year, Williams Township will be spending about \$280,000.00 for road upgrades and maintenance. There are several areas of local roads where these improvements will be seen: 9 Mile Rd. between Hotchkiss and Salzburg and also between Townline 14 to just south of Chip Rd.; Wilder Rd. between Carter and Flajole Rd. (this will start in the fall). Final coats of chip and seal will also be applied to Flajole Rd. between Hotchkiss and Salzburg and Flajole Rd. between Wheeler and Wilder. Wear-coats of chip and seal are being applied to Townline 14 Rd. between 8 Mile Rd. and Garfield Rd. (these two miles are in cooperation with Beaver Township) and between Rockwell Drive (Bay-Mid Line Road) and Flajole Rd. on N. Union Road.

Williams Township is fortunate to have this amount of money available to use for road improvement. Many smaller Townships are less fortunate and are turning their once paved roads back into gravel. We currently do not have plans to do this, but we may have less to spend in the upcoming years due to reduced tax revenue from Lansing and decreasing property values in our area. We are continuing to pay very close attention to our budget process and not extend ourselves further than we can afford.

### **Emergency Warning Siren**

In the very near future, Williams Township, in cooperation with Bay County Emergency Services and 911 Central Dispatch, will be installing an emergency warning siren at the north end of Pine Grove Cemetery. The funding for this siren was provided by a federal homeland security grant in the amount of \$10,000.00 procured by Bay County. Dow Corning Corporation partnered with Bay County and donated \$5,000.00 from their Auburn Site, located on 11 Mile Road, and \$5,000.00 from their Corporate Site, located on Salzburg road.

This warning siren will allow for notification of emergency situations in our area, and has the ability to be activated from either Bay or Midland County, depending where the emergency originates. Maintenance of this siren will be paid for by Bay County 911 with the township paying for the cost of electricity. The siren will be tested periodically as determined by 911 personnel.

This is a "win-win" situation for all units of government, the end result being the safety of our residents. The only cost incurred for this entire project by Williams Township is a controller which enables activation of the siren by either Bay County or Midland County.



On May 7 of this year, our township had some "extra hands" help with preparing our Township Park for another busy season of activities. This help came from the Great Lakes BMX Club based in Midland through the assistance of their leader Andrea Jozwiak. The BMX Club applied for and was awarded a grant by the Dow Chemical Corporation, to assist them in expanding their club. The only stipulation to them was to perform "community service" in their area. They went a bit further and chose one public park from each of the three Great Lakes Bay Region counties and volunteered their time and effort to "improve the community you live in".

This group of young and energetic members descended on the Williams Township Park at about 9 a.m. on Saturday, May 7, 2011, and proceeded to reduce the piles of sand strategically placed throughout the park, to mere memories of what was once there. They did an excellent job of following directions and helping wherever they were needed. In less than two hours, these youngsters, along with great coaching, were able to help our community by placing their energy toward a worthwhile cause.

On behalf of Williams Township, I wish to extend our most sincere "Thank You" to the Great Lakes BMX Club, and particularly their leader, Andrea Jozwiak, for their efforts and enthusiasm. We appreciate those who volunteered their time to make this project successful.

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## **Williams Township Proposed Midland Road West – Pedestrian Pathway February 1, 2011**

Williams Township is a rural community of approximately 35 square miles, located in Bay County, Michigan. The population is approximately 4700 people. It encompasses the City of Auburn, which is approximately one square mile.

Midland Road is a main east-west road through the township, and the city of Auburn.

In the past 20 years, numerous subdivisions have been constructed along Midland road, west of Garfield road. These include; Country Estates, Fisherville, Briarwood, Zielinski Estates, Carter Ridge, Pear Grove, and Gray Hawk. Subdivisions along this route previously developed are Myra Lee, Meadow, Court, Garfield, and

Bis. There are numerous other short streets connecting to Midland Road.

Midland Road, west of the city of Auburn, is a primary road, and within the area between Flajole Road and Garfield Road is; the Township Hall and Park, St. Anthony Church, Fruitland Market, Meiskes Market, and Forest Daycare.

In Auburn at Garfield Road is a shopping Plaza with among other stores, a grocery store and the Auburn Post Office.

In Auburn just east of Garfield Road is the Middle School, High School, and a little further east, is the Elementary School. There are doctors' offices, pizza parlors, laundromat, the City Park, hair salons, and convenience stores. There are sidewalks in Auburn from Garfield road east. Just south of Midland Road along Garfield Road there are also sidewalks connecting to two fast food restaurants, and a hotel.

It is estimated that over 90% of the growth of the township in the last 20 years has been along this Midland road west corridor.

Many residents use the shoulder of the existing roadway for walking, running, and/or biking. The road is very busy with trucks, buses, farm equipment, and vehicles. The main speed limit along this section is 50 miles per hour.

The two Dow Corning facilities have grown substantially, and during the lunch hour, employees can be seen walking and running around the facility, and along Midland Road.

Residents in the township are seeking recreational activities for exercise. Many residents have inquired about a pedestrian pathway connecting the subdivision areas with the downtown area. The pedestrian pathway could ultimately connect with the Bay City Railtrail, and the city of Midland pedestrian pathway system.

This pathway can connect the Dow Corning Facility with the Township Park and Community facilities, propel the use of non-motorized vehicles, and promote exercise and healthier living in the community.

An 8' wide asphalt pedestrian pathway could be constructed from Garfield Road west to Flajole Road for an estimated cost of \$500,000. The township is seeking grants to help pay for this important community project. The Township Engineer, Civil Engineering Consultants, is willing to donate ½ of their services for Design and Construction Administration for the completion of this project.
